This day has profound significance, marking both the social, political, and economic achievements of women, and the fight against discrimination and violence that persists in many parts of the world. It is a moment of awareness and an opportunity to draw attention to issues such as gender equality, reproductive rights, and abuse against women.

History:

International Women's Day was first celebrated in 1909, when the American Socialist Party decided to organize a "National Women's Day" on March 28th. In 1911, International Women's Day was celebrated for the first time globally, on March 19th. Today, in many cultures, women and girls are given gifts, flowers, or other tokens of appreciation on this special day. International Women's Day was officially adopted by the United Nations in 1977 and is celebrated in 193 countries.

Thus, we celebrate femininity, women's achievements, and rights, but we do not forget that this day also represents a continuous struggle for a more equitable and safer world for all women.

Traditions and Customs of Women's Day

March 8th is symbolically linked to flowers. Specifically, the international "mascot" of the holiday is the tulip. This flower represents spring and delicacy and is given to women on their day, along with sincere congratulations. In some countries, more emphasis is placed on Mother's Day on March 8th, a celebration marked by giving gifts and flowers to them
