Mărțișoare bring luck Widely practiced today in villages and cities, the mărțișor

is made of two twisted threads of wool or silk, one white

and one red, to which a small handmade object is attached. It is given to ladies and young girls on the first day of the calendar spring, and they are to wear it pinned to their chest for one or more days. It is said that mărţişoare bring luck and happiness, which is why other symbols of luck, such as a four-leaf clover, horseshoe, chimney sweep, or heart, are added to this thread, tied in the form of a bow.

How old is Mărțișor traditionAccording to archaeological research conducted in our

country, the tradition of Mărţişor dates back approximately 8,000 years. Amulets similar to Mărţişor, represented by perforated pebbles in white and red colors, have been discovered and were worn around the neck as necklaces. It seems that the two colors were carefully chosen, as red was associated with blood, referring to the sacrificial rituals practiced at the beginning of spring, while white symbolized the purity of snow, ice, and clouds. When united, the two colors expressed the desire to bid farewell to winter and welcome spring, symbolizing the return to life.

Dragobete's Day - February 24

Dragobete is a character taken from the ancient Dacians and later transformed into a protector of the youth and patron of love. Following certain folk legends, it seems that Dragobete (also called "Head of Spring," "The Swift," or "Fiancé of the Birds") was none other than the son of old woman Dochia, an extremely handsome and loving lad who seduced the women who crossed his path. Dragobete has remained to this day as the supreme symbol of native love. In ancient times (in certain areas even today!), on this day of great celebration, young people dressed in beautiful and decent clothes used to gather in forests and pick the first flowers of spring into bouquets. Flower picking continued with joy and songs, with a kind of game called "flighting." At noon, the girls would run back to the village, and the boys would chase them, trying to catch them and give them a kiss. If the boy was dear to the girl, she would let herself be caught, and later the kiss would take place, considered equivalent to engagement and the beginning of love between the two. Towards evening, the engagement was to be announced to the village community and family members.



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
